MHS Program	Program Description
<input type="checkbox"/> Academy of Hospitality & Tourism	The Academy of Hospitality & Tourism provides an opportunity for students who are interested in the travel/tourism/hospitality industry to be exposed to the industry first-hand. Opportunities in job shadowing, internships, community service, team building and leadership, and self-esteem training are made available to the students. Funds are needed to finance the various activities (transportation, field trips, refreshments, etc.) that the program pursues.
<input type="checkbox"/> Art/Music Dept.	The Art Department is in need of a computer projector to show large, colorful visuals from art CDs/DVDs/internet. A computer projector will provide Art History students the opportunity to identify and evaluate artworks from different cultures and historical periods, art masterpieces and the artists who created them, and identify the elements and principles of art. Large projected visuals on a screen will enhance a curriculum that is visually oriented. Funds will be used toward the purchase of the computer projector.
<input type="checkbox"/> Band	The McKinley High School Band has a long and proud history of musical excellence. Besides inspiring students to strive for excellence in musicianship, it also provides the students first hand experience in recognizing the power of how their individual effort at achieving mastery of their musical instrument can combine with the skills of their band mates to produce a powerful and inspirational musical performance. Funds are used to cover bus transportation costs, and to defray various costs involved with participation in various band competitions.
<input type="checkbox"/> Center for Tomorrow's Leaders	McKinley High School's Center for Tomorrow's Leaders is a leadership development course for non-traditional student leaders (those not in any formal leadership roles). These students learn leadership principles and use them directly in the school to make a positive difference.
<input type="checkbox"/> Digital Media	The Digital Media program is a new program that serves students interested in the media industry. The program's goal is to provide meaningful, relevant, engaged, hands-on opportunities to learn about the media industry. Students learn how to storyboard, direct, tape, and produce a variety of projects related to school-wide concerns, health issues, sports highlights, etc. They will also learn digital editing techniques. The program will seek internship opportunities, and hope to participate in state, national and international video production competitions. Funds are used to purchase equipment and software for the various course needs.
<input type="checkbox"/> Engineering Academy	The McKinley Engineering Academy was founded to support students who have expressed interest in the field of engineering. Its vision is to graduate students with a strong foundation to become successful engineers, and its mission is to provide an integrated curriculum focusing on applied mathematics, science, and technology for future engineers. Funds are used to publicize the program to feeder schools, and purchase equipment.
<input type="checkbox"/> English to Second Language Learners	The English to Second Language Learners (ESLL) Department affords immigrant students a course curriculum to develop their English skills. It also affords these students an opportunity to share their ethnicity and culture with their peers and with the public through their annual “Multi-Cultural Extravaganza Talk Story,” a program of songs, dance, and story telling. Funds are used for refreshments, leis, program printing and security guard service.

<input type="checkbox"/>	Gear Up Hawaii Program	McKinley High School is one of three public high schools with the Gear Up Hawaii Program, whose goal is to provide students from low-income families the opportunity to attend college locally or on the mainland. The program is federally funded and is administered by the UHM College of Business. In the coming school year, the students hope to visit a dozen college campuses in Southern California. They will tour the campuses during the day, and have seminars on college planning in the evenings. The program has a variety of fund raisers underway, and it seeks additional funds. Funds will be used to defray expenses for the trip.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Graphic Technology Learning Center	The Graphic Technology Learning Center allows students to pursue their interest in a field that has experienced rapid growth in recent years. The Center permits students to explore the various ways information is gathered and disseminated, and gives the students hands-on exposure to the various tools that are used by the media and by graphic artists. Funds are used to purchase or update equipment and to provide the software and supplies that the equipment requires.
<input type="checkbox"/>	JROTC	The McKinley JROTC program is an elective program that participates in various local and national JROTC competitions. On occasion, students and/or the drill team have performed so well in local competitions that they are invited to participate at the national level. It is during these times that the JROTC program has requested financial assistance to defray the travel expenses of these competition-bound students.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Kanazawa Sister-School Relationship	The Kanazawa Commercial High School relationship was established over 20 years ago. Each year, Kanazawa students visit Hawaii. Funds would assist McKinley host organizers with the purchase of leis, student gifts, etc.
<input type="checkbox"/>	“Ke Ola Hou” Program	Ke Ola Hou is the name of a program that organizes an annual variety show of student talent to promote awareness of the dangers of drug and substance abuse. The show is held during school hours and is open to the entire student body. Students not only perform in the show, but they also operate the light and sound system, and design and plan the theme and program. Funds are used to defray the cost of printing the program, providing wristlets for staff and students, leis, and refreshments for the cast and crew.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Math Team	The Math Team participates in monthly competitions of the Oahu Mathematics League, and the annual Hawaii State Mathematics Bowl. Students and math faculty spend long hours after school practicing for competitions. Funds are used for transportation to meets, competition entry fees, team shirts, meals, and snacks.
<input type="checkbox"/>	McKinley Theater Group II	The McKinley Theater Group II is an after school program that promotes awareness of speech and drama activities, improve oral communication skills, and encourage appreciation of culture within our society. This awareness is made possible by participation in the performing arts and speech and debate competitions locally and nationally. Funds are used to defray transportation expenses to various competitions and tournaments, and for the annual show that they perform that is open to the public.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Project Graduation	The Project Graduation program is an activity aimed at providing graduating seniors, on the night of their graduation, a fun, alcohol-free, safe environment to celebrate their last day and night together as classmates. Various entertaining and participatory activities are planned throughout the night, and many expenses are incurred. The students pay to participate in this event. Funds are used to defray the expense of the activities and thereby reduce the cost that each individual student must pay.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Robotics Team	The McKinley Robotics program serves students who are interested in pursuing careers in science, engineering and technology. It exposes students to real life applications of academic and technical subjects. The ability to translate academic knowledge into practical solutions to better our lives is a major benefit to students of this program. Funds are used to enhance the program, and to prepare for school, state, and national competitions.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Science Fair	The Science Fair begins in science classrooms where students choose a science project to explore, and create storyboards and models to describe their projects. These projects are judged, and awards are given for the projects considered most worthy. The winners move on to state, national and even international competition. Funds are used to construct and repair frames for the display of the storyboards, to pay for refreshments and lunch for the judges, and for monetary prizes to the winning students to embellish and improve their storyboards.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Science Olympiad Program	The aim of the program is to increase student interest in science and provide recognition for outstanding achievement in science for students. The Science Olympiad tournaments are rigorous academic interscholastic competitions that consist of a series of events ranging from mathematics, biology, chemistry, physics, and engineering. All of the events require teamwork, group planning, and cooperation. Students who compete at the tournament will learn to interact, have fun, and develop team spirit while fostering an interest in science and technology. Funds will be used to purchase supplies for the building events, and to pay for study materials, team shirts, and snacks.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Special Educ. Community Based Instruction Program	The Special Education Community Based Instruction (CBI) Program, initiated in July 2005 for Special Education students, focuses on three areas of vocational training: horticulture (primarily ornamental plants), auto detailing, and food services. Learning is achieved through practical application and first-hand experience. The program’s requirement for supplies is extensive, and monetary donations as well as material donations are always welcome.
